

## 631 W. WATER STREET

In the early 1900's, harness shops were prominent in every community, and Princeton's early proprietors, Fred Siepert and Emil Henning had a shop at this location. As the automobile era emerged, the harness shops closed. In 1941 a local barber, Karl Kuehnemann purchased the building. Karl offered a high class of barbering services, with a reputation for "keen razors, sharp shears, and the know-how to satisfy shaving and modern haircuts". He barbered for 50 years. Subsequent uses included several retail shops, The Muk Luk Museum, and Treat's Landing which was named after Princeton's Founder, Royal Treat.



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
